J. T. Miles Funeral Home opened in 1930 at 901 N. J. St. Then it moved a few years later to 818 Vermont Street - this location continued to serve the black community as the Bowser et al Mortuary, until closing in 1982.

John Turner Miles was born May 6, 1891 in Birmingham, Alabama. Mr. Miles and his first wife, Katie Mae, resided in St. Louis, Missouri, before moving to Atchison, Kansas. Mrs. Miles was one of the few black females with Kansas and Missouri Embalmer's Licenses. From 1927 until his death on December 15, 1971, they owned and operated the Miles Funeral in Atchison - In 1930, the Miles' had opened a funeral establishment in Lawrence, Kansas but it was closed due to the death of Mrs. Miles in 1941. Mr. Miles died in 1971.

S. Newton Bowser opened his first funeral home in Topeka, KS in June 1930 at 1812 SW Van Buren Street. He later established a second branch in Lawrence, KS. Mr. Bowser operated the business at both locations

until his health failed in 1961. His wife, Pearl Bowser continued the operation during his illness and after his death in 1967.

Newt Bowser came from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in

1919. He opened his first funeral home in Parsons, Kansas. He founded the Bower Mortuary in Topeka, Kansas, June 30, 1931. In 1941 he opened another branch funeral home in Lawrence. For the next twenty years he devoted all of his time and service to the Topeka and Lawrence communities.

Mr. Bowser died August 12, 1967. From November, 1961, his wife, Mrs. Pearl E. Bowser, continued to manage the Topeka and Lawrence homes and served these areas for fifteen years. In 1967 Mrs. Bowser sold the business to Larry Johnson in Topeka who kept the business in Lawrence open until 1982.

MS. COSBY: What memories of funerals do you have? I know you've probably attended a lot of funerals.
MR. MONROE: The Bowser, then Bowser-Lee was the funeral home up there on Vermont Street, the six-hundred block of Vermont.

MS. COSBY: Bowser and Bowser-Lee?
MR. MONROE: Yeah, there was Bowser, but Lee joined him later. That's where our funerals were. Bowser left Lawrence, because I guess there wasn't that much business. He went to Topeka. Most of the black folks here now use Warren-McElwain. What's the name of the one out there now? What do they call it?

MS. COSBY: Rumsey?

MR. MONROE: Rumsey's. But back in those early days, they were really prejudiced.

MS. COSBY: Rumsey's?

MR. MONROE: Right. They wouldn't bury a black person. I think that's why everybody started going to Warren-McElwain when they had to.

MS. COSBY: Were funerals typically segregated events?

MR. MONROE: No. I remember white folks being at our funerals. And we went to some of the white folks' funerals. But those would be in the churches. It didn't have nothing to do with the mortuaries.

BIOGRAPHY of John Turner Miles

John Turner Miles was born May 6, 1891 in Birmingham, Alabama, to Augustus G. Miles and Eliza Jane Fletcher. From 1927 until his death on December 15, 1971, he owned and operated the Miles Funeral Home (also known as the J.T. Miles Funeral Home and the J. T. Miles Mortuary) in Atchison, Kansas. Miles used his position as businessman, religious leader, and civic servant to champion the cause of minority enterprise.

J.T. Miles and his first wife, Katie Mae, resided in St. Louis, Missouri, before moving to Atchison, Kansas. On June 30, 1927, they purchased for \$250.00 a building at 707 North 9th Street in Atchison and therein opened the Miles Funeral Home on July 17, 1927. Mrs. Miles was one of the few African American females with Kansas and Missouri embalmer's licenses. On May 14, 1930, the Miles opened a second funeral home at 814 Vermont Street in Lawrence, Kansas, which they operated until Mrs. Miles' death on January 15, 1943. Later that same year, Miles married Geneva Ramsey of St. Joseph, Missouri, who became a licensed lady attendant at the Atchison funeral home. The business was licensed in Missouri and Kansas.

Upon Miles' death, his children, Etta Mae Hunter, R.N. and George Miles, continued to run the family business until it closed in 1990.

SCOPE and CONTENTS

The papers of John Turner Miles date from 1922 to 1976, and are arranged in three series: Diaries, Business Papers and Personal Papers. There are 29 diaries, dating from 1922 to 1959. They are grouped by decade and arranged chronologically by year. All but one of the diaries document J.T. Miles' personal life and business affairs as a mortician. The exception is a 1948 diary of an unidentified woman, most likely Geneva Miles. J.T. Miles' daily diary entries, which usually begin with a brief note about the weather, chronicle his activities in Atchison, the surrounding Kansas communities of Lawrence, Troy, Hiawatha, and also St. Joseph, Missouri. In addition to recording the struggles of an African American small

businessman in the mid-1900s, the diaries reveal the names of the deceased whom he embalmed and buried. Three printing blocks are housed with the diaries.

The collection's Business Papers date from 1927 to 1976 and include funeral home documents, promotional material, and newspaper clippings.

Personal papers consist of Miles family birth and death records. Subject contents of these series are alphabetical, with chronological subarrangement of items within folders.

The photographs in the John Turner Miles Collection depict J.T. Miles and his daughter Etta Mae Hunter in family, business and civic settings. They are located at RH MS-P 588.

One oversized item, a 1983 wall calendar picturing Etta Mae as a young girl, is located at RH MS Q107.
