### From the President Barry Shalinsky

2025 has already been a time of big changes. Weatherwise in February, we literally went from subzero to sixty in a couple of days. Anyone following national and international current events can see seismic shifts happening – changes with not-so-tiny ripple effects in Lawrence and Kansas, are being felt at Haskell Indian Nations University and elsewhere. At

the state level, the culture wars continue, and Governor Kelly's veto pen no longer has the weight it carried before last November.

Flying more under the radar, there are big changes underway in Lawrence, and East Lawrence too. In April, a new Land Development Code will go into effect in Lawrence. The new code will essentially eliminate all single-family zoning, will increase allowable population density per dwelling unit, and will reduce off-street parking requirements.

In East Lawrence, we are already seeing a significant uptick in demolitions of modest historic housing, with larger and more expensive replacement units being constructed. With the changes to the Land Development Code, we can expect this trend to accelerate in East Lawrence, and spread to neighborhoods that consist primarily of modest mid-century era housing. A purported goal of the new code is to incentivize new housing options, leading to greater affordability. I believe it will have the opposite effect, incentivizing wholesale demolitions to occur in the very neighborhoods that have the largest supply of affordable housing. For many first time homebuyers, these modest homes are the only avenue for people working at the local wage scale to build any type of generational wealth through home ownership. New rentals are more likely to be of the luxury variety than "permanently affordable", unless significant public subsidies are provided.

In the face of these changes, ELNA is looking for ways to preserve the unique characteristics of our built environment, our neighborhood culture, and to maintain some level of affordability. One tool that people successfully use to preserve their homes is to get them listed on national, state and local registers of historic places. See more "how to" info inside this Newsletter.

In March, ELNA will participate in the St. Pat's Parade on the 17th in Downtown Lawrence, and will host the ELNA Yart (Yard + Art) Sale at New York School on March 29th. Contact Lane at <u>eastlawrence@yahoo.com</u> to volunteer your help for either event.

In times of uncertainty and change, the one thing you can count on is that ELNA will be advocating for our little 'hood that could, and helping everyone to have fun doing it.

# East Lawrence Culture is Queer

"In East Lawrence, you're okay." Below our neighborhood motto, a scrappy possum hangs out; holding a tool in one paw, a pride flag in the other. Not only are they scrappy, they represent the underdog. The rainbow, trans, and inclusive flags also pepper the front porches, flag poles, and windows of many homes in East Lawrence.

As an abolitionist college town, it's no surprise that Lawrence has been a safe haven to Kansas queers. For example, in 2005, the Kansas Amendment 1 to Kansas's constitution made it unconstitutional for the state to recognize or perform same-sex marriages or civil unions. Douglas County was the only county in Kansas where voters rejected the 2005 amendment. In 2013, the first Trans-Kansas Conference was hosted in Lawrence. But why, in particular, have many queers chosen to call East Lawrence their home?

One reason is its location. East Lawrence borders Mass Street, the lively downtown area where weirdos of Kansas have gathered to perform art and build community for ages. From the Sister Kettle Cafe, known as a "vegetarian's delight" in the 70s; to the lesbian-feminist bookstore, the Spinsters, in the 80s; to Replay, Henry's upstairs, and the Bourgeois Pig today; Mass offers Lawrence queers safe places to connect and be themselves.

Other reasons are less tangible. A mother of three who has called East Lawrence her home for 25 years said, "East Lawrence has been a great place to raise queer kids. I knew it was a more open and accepting place for them... I've always felt safe letting them roam the neighborhood. It's hard to put into words, but I knew that growing up here wouldn't crush their spirit." It's a feeling that might be supported by the architecture. Another East Lawrencian reflected that the mix of new and old, small and larger duplexes and single-family homes supports the feeling that, "Everyone is just living together under different circumstances and just cool with each other."

### **Change of Value Notices**

The Douglas County Appraiser's Office mailed Change of Value notices for real estate properties for the 2025 tax year on Feb. 28. These notices also included an informational insert about the valuation process, an overall market snapshot of residential and commercial value changes, and the appeal process.

Most residential property owners can expect to see property values increase between 2% and 8% from the prior year, while most commercial property owners will experience increases between 5% and 10%. According to the Appraiser's Office, these value increases are typically due to year-over-year price increases, supply demand imbalances, renovations or additions to existing structures, or changes in property use.

The mailed notices also provided resources for taxpayers to obtain additional information about current or previous property assessments, as well as guidance on the property value appeal process in Kansas.

Appeal process: Property owners who want to appeal their property value must fill out the request form located on the back of the notice and submit it to the Appraiser's Office by 5 p.m. Monday, March 31. Submissions can be mailed or dropped off at the office, which is located in the basement of the County Courthouse at 1100 Massachusetts St., or emailed to appeals@dgcoks.gov.

Information sessions: For the first time, the Douglas County Appraiser's Office is offering information sessions. They will be at the County Courthouse, 1100 Massachusetts St., in the Commission meeting room on the second floor. These sessions are free and open to the public:

Monday, March 24, 5:30 p.m.-6:30 p.m. – A formal presentation about the valuation process, current market trends, property taxes and the appeal process, followed by a question-and-answer session.

Monday, March 31, 9 a.m.-4 p.m. – A walk-in session where residents can meet with a Douglas County appraiser and ask questions about property values.

### **Sunrise Project Update**

Sunrise Project will be relocating their headquarters to Centenary United Methodist Church in North Lawrence at 245 N. 4th Street. This move entails a partnership with Centenary UMC based on the shared values of social justice, inclusivity and social connection. This organizational move begins in March 2025. Therefore, all site-based Sunrise programming will be paused starting March 1, until the move is complete. The plan is for Sunrise to offer on-site programming in their new North Lawrence location by the end of April or beginning of May.

Sunrise Project's new headquarters at Centenary United Methodist Church includes a large fellowship hall, kitchen, administrative space and an outdoor area for gardening.

As announced to the community in August 2024, Sunrise Project began the search for a new site in response to their landlord's decision to place the east-side location on the market.

### East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan Updates

In 2021, work began on an update of the East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan, but it was abruptly halted in late 2022 as the planning staff turned its attention to amending the Lawrence Land Development Code (LDC). Now that the new LDC has been adopted and is slated to take effect in April, ELNA has been advocating for the Neighborhood Plan to be put back on the front burner.

This is the latest word from City planning staff: "We [hope to] have a workshop for the East Lawrence Plan in late March or early April. At this workshop we will refine the vision statement that was drafted from the surveys and public input sessions and work on goals for the plan. We hope everyone will join us to help in this very important stage. We will have some materials available on our website prior to the meeting. ### **Compost Facility Opening for Season**

The City of Lawrence Compost facility will officially open for self-load events starting Saturday, March 8, 2025, providing high-quality compost and woodchips made from locally collected yard waste.

2025 Season Highlights:

Opening Day: Saturday, March 8, 2025

Operating Hours: 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.

Drop-Off: Available to Lawrence residents only, with proof of residency required.

Self-Load Events: Available to Lawrence residents only, with proof of residency required.

City-Load Events: Scheduled for the first Saturdays of April\*, May, June, and October (pending material availability). There will be no drop-off available during City-Load events. The April event will be for Lawrence residents only, with the other City-Load events being open to the public.

To ensure smooth operations and accommodate demand, city-load events will have a one-scoop limit until 10:30 a.m. or until the line clears 11th Street, at staff's discretion. Additionally, no self-loading or yard waste drop-offs will be allowed during cityload events to streamline operations and improve traffic flow.

#### **Updated Pricing Structure:**

The City of Lawrence remains committed to providing an affordable service while ensuring operational efficiency. The pricing for the 2025 season is as follows:

#### Self-Loaded Material (Residents Only)

Less than 20 gallons per trip - FREE

More than 20 gallons per trip - \$10

City-Loaded Material \$15 per scoop


Yard Waste Drop-Off Fees Small and large drop-offs – \$10 Extra-large drop-offs (truck & trailer, dump truck) – \$20

Personal motorized loading equipment (e.g., skid steers) is not allowed.

Residents must bring their own tools for self-loading.

The facility may close or adjust hours due to weatherrelated issues, with advance notice provided whenever possible.

Customers should avoid stopping on the railroad tracks while waiting to enter the facility.
